The Failure of Proposition 16: A Post-Election Analysis

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Many Biden Voters Voted No on Prop 16

California voters overwhelmingly voted for Joe Biden, 64% to 34%.¹ But most voters also voted against Proposition 16, that sought to bring back the use of race, ethnicity, and gender in public university admissions, government hiring, and government contracting. Roughly 57% voted no on Prop 16; 43% voted yes.




Figure 1 California Counties' Presidential Vote and Votes on Prop 16²

The screenshots (Figure 1) show the contrast between Biden votes and Yes votes, by California counties.

The map on the left shows the counties with a majority of Biden votes in blue and Trump votes in red. Darker shades of blue and red mean a larger percentage per county. The map on the right shows the Yes on 16 counties in aqua and the No on 16 in orange.

My calculations found that the total Yes vote made up 65% of the Biden vote.³ This means that 35% of Biden voters voted No on Prop 16. Distributed across the counties, this accounts for the overwhelming number of counties "turning orange."

The results by county are staggering. There are NO counties where the Yes vote exceeded the Biden vote.⁴

Only 6 California counties voted Yes on Prop 16: San Francisco, Marin, Alameda, Santa Cruz, San Mateo and LA County (See Table 1 below.). Roughly one in four of Biden voters in San Francisco and Alameda counties voted No on Prop 16 (25% and 26%, respectively).

Even in LA County, a majority-minority county and the largest of the counties (with a population of 10 million), 71% voted for Biden while 51% voted for Prop 16, resulting in a vote loss of over 28%. But what about blank ballots on propositions?

Additional statistical analyses in my report⁶ showed the following:

- There was *no correlation* between proportion of Hispanics and votes for or against Prop 16.
- Counties with greater percentages of blacks also had more support for Prop 16, but the statistical association was small.
- Counties with proportionately more whites had more No on 16 votes.
- There was a moderate relationship between larger percentages of Asian residents and support for Prop 16. (Many Asians were active on both sides of the Prop 16 movement.)
- The most robust relationship was between a county's percentage of college graduates and Yes on 16, not race.

• Moreover, the statistical relationship between percentage of Asians in a county and Yes on 16 votes disappears when controlling for college degree.

In short, it's the percentage of voters with a college degree that predicts the Yes vote. Even so, there was a significant number of Biden voters with college degrees who voted No on 16.

Proponents of Prop 16 insist that many voters did not understand what the proposition would bring forth. With better endorsements, advertising, donations, media coverage, and outreach, more California voters would favor using race, ethnicity, and gender in college admissions, government jobs, and government contracts.

Yet the county-level data highlight how racial preference issues are pushed by elites but rejected by the people, even in an overwhelming liberal, majority-minority state like California.

Americans on the whole strongly believe in judging individuals as individuals, not just as members of racial/ethnic groups. Over the past few years, many national and local polls have shown that Americans really dislike preferences based on race. Americans favor merit-based admissions, jobs, and contracts, although they favor other affirmative action measures such as targeted outreach and improving K-12 education. Californians decisively rejected race-based government policies, despite overwhelming support for Biden. These results will hopefully inform the Supreme Court as it faces issues of racial preferences and anti-Asian admissions at Harvard and other elite universities.
